What is Asian America in 2020's?

To address the questions, for me, being an Asian American creating "Asian American" art means examining the stories we have inherited, sifting through the tangled narratives, untangling the knots, and reweaving the strands into a tapestry of resilience and justice. To me, being Asian American means constantly relocating myself in a nation that does not know how to "place" me and my body, caught between the racial binary, triangulating between degrees of whiteness and brownness. It means being caught a multitude of paradoxes (conspicuous, yet invisible; POC yet white adjacent model minority, privileged yet persecuted...) and learning to hold opposing ideas and experiences within the same context.
